Introduction to Epiphany Sunday and the Season AFTER Epiphany

The season of Epiphany is a day... and the rest of the Sundays are called the Sundays after Epiphany.

The festival of the Epiphany of Our Lord on January 6, celebrating the visit of the Magi who followed the star to honour the Christ child. This service emphasizes themes of light, revelation, and God's universal love, as the gospel of Matthew highlights Jesus' manifestation to the nations. Traditionally, this service includes prayers for global missions, the proclamation of Christ as the light of the world, and hymns such as "Brightest and Best of the Stars of the Morning" (ELW 303) or "The First Noel" (ELW 300). Epiphany offers an opportunity to bless homes for the new year and to reflect on the guiding light of Christ in our lives. (For a house/sanctuary/office blessing, see resources below.)

Consider moving the Epiphany service onto Sunday, January 5th.

The weeks that follow explore Jesus' identity and mission, beginning with his baptism and continuing through his early ministry as he calls disciples, performs miracles, and preaches transformative teachings. Central to this season are themes of inclusion, justice, and renewal, woven through Paul's letters to the Corinthians and gospel accounts of Jesus' actions. The season culminates with the Transfiguration, a glimpse of Christ's divine glory and a foreshadowing of his journey to the cross.

Epiphany invites us into a journey of discovery, reminding us that Jesus is the light for all nations. It calls us to live out our baptismal identity, follow Christ in faith and love, and reflect his light in the world. As we move from the brightness of Christmas into the promise of Lent, Epiphany offers a time to see Christ revealed in our midst and to carry his light into every corner of creation.

Monday, January 6, 2025 Epiphany of Our Lord, Year C

(Consider replacing 'Christmas 2' with these Epiphany readings on January 5th)

Prayer of the Day

O God, on this day you revealed your Son to the nations by the leading of a star. Lead us now by faith to know your presence in our lives, and bring us at last to the full vision of your glory, through your Son, Jesus Christ our Lord, who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and forever. **Amen.**

Prayer of the Day

Almighty God, you anointed Jesus at his baptism with the Holy Spirit and revealed him as your beloved Son. Keep all who are born of water and the Spirit faithful in your service, that we may rejoice to be called children of God, through Jesus Christ, our Savior and Lord, who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and forever. **Amen.**

- Second Reading Acts 8:14-17
- Gospel Luke 3:15-17, 21-22

Sunday, February 23, 2025 Seventh Sunday after Epiphany / Lectionary 7, Year C

Prayer of the Day

O Lord Jesus, make us instruments of your peace, that where there is hatred, we may sow love, where there is injury, pardon, and where there is despair, hope. Grant, O divine master, that we may seek to console, to understand, and to love in your name, for you live and reign with the Father and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and forever. **Amen.**

- Second Reading 1 Corinthians 15:35-38, 42-50
- Gospel Luke 6:27-38

Candlemas Service Outline (OPTION)

Here is a simple option to add to Sunday morning (Smaller communities have an easier time lighting all the candles at the same time):

Gathering

1. Procession of Light

- o Assemble in a dimmed space; distribute candles to the congregation.
- Begin with a liturgical greeting:
 Leader: "Arise, shine, for your light has come, and the glory of the Lord has risen upon you!"

 Assembly: "Thanks be to God, the light of Christ!"

2. Blessing of the Candles

- Place all the candles to be blessed on the altar or a central table.
- Use a blessing prayer from ELW Occasional Services for the Assembly (pp. 165–167) or a custom prayer, such as:
 "O God, source of all light, bless these candles. May they remind us of Christ, the light of the world. As these candles shine in our worship, may your light shine in our hearts and through our lives. Amen."

3. Lighting the Assembly Candles

 Light a central candle (e.g., the Paschal Candle) and share the light with the congregation. Hold the candles throughout the service if that makes sense to do, or you can find a place to put them down. After the service the candles can be taken home as a physical reminder of the light that is with us always.

Word

1. Opening Hymn

 "Jesus, the Light of the World" (ACS 914) or "When Jesus Came to Jordan" (ELW 305)

2. Prayer of the Day

- "Almighty and ever-living God, as your only Son was presented this day in the temple, show us the light of your salvation, that we may reflect your glory to the world, through Jesus Christ, our Savior and Lord. Amen."
- 3. **Readings** (Candles can remain lit as you hear the word proclaimed)

o First Reading: Malachi 3:1-4

o Psalm: Psalm 84 ("How lovely is your dwelling place")

o Second Reading: Hebrews 2:14-18

o Gospel: Luke 2:22-40

4. Homily

 Focus on Jesus as the light for revelation and the call to be bearers of that light in the world.

Ritual of Light

- 1. Candle Procession (Replacement for the Prayers of the people, or addition too).
 - o Invite the congregation to process around the worship space with their lit candles, singing a hymn such as "This Little Light of Mine" or "Shine, Jesus, Shine." It's the movement of the light that represents the movement of our prayers and the movement of the Spirit among us.

Meal (if Eucharist is included)

1. Offering and Setting the Table

 Candles can remain lit as a visual connection between the Word and the Meal.

2. Great Thanksgiving and Communion

Sending

1. Blessing

"May Christ, the light of the world, shine brightly in you. Go in peace, and let your light shine for all to see. Amen."

2. Closing Hymn

"Go, My Children, with My Blessing" (ELW 543) or "Christ, Be Our Light" (ELW 715)

3. Extinguishing the Candles

 Encourage worshipers to take their candles home as a reminder of their calling to shine Christ's light in their daily lives.

3: House Blessing (On Epiphany or during the season after Epiphany):

House Blessing 2025

Take chalk and prepare to mark on the lintel of your front door. As you read below, you will draw each large letter, number, and symbol from the left column while reading the words to the right. The final drawing on the door will look like this:

$$20 + C + M + B + 25$$

Gather at the front door.

"The three Wise Men,

- C Casper,
- M Melchoir,
- B and Balthasar, followed the star of God's Son who became human
- 20 two thousand
- 24 twenty five years ago.
- + + May Christ bless this place,
- + + and remain with us through the new year.

 Amen"

God is love, and those who abide in love abide in God, and God abides in them. Christ, God's incarnation, is present in the love and care we manifest to each other in our ordinary daily lives together.

Let us pray, (pause)
